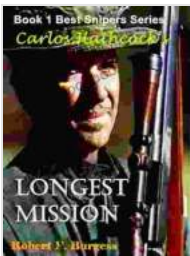


Carlos Hathcock: Longest Mission, Best Snipers

Early Life and Career

Hathcock was born in Little Rock, Arkansas, in 1942. He grew up in a small town and was an avid hunter and outdoorsman from a young age.

Post-Vietnam War

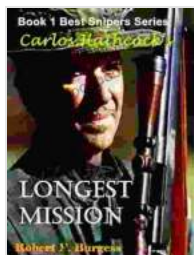
